Strategic Review

STRATEGIC PILLARS

The Faculty of Social Sciences' overarching priority is excellence in the core, timeless activities of education, scholarly research, and service to the University, to our professions, and to local, national, and international communities. The way we achieve excellence in these activities, the specific aims we pursue, and the people with whom we collaborate in these activities evolve continuously.

To guide our efforts, in 2021 the Faculty established a strategic plan that prioritized five cross-cutting areas of focus for our community members through 2025: interdisciplinarity; experiential learning and career guidance; equity, diversity, inclusion, and Indigenous strategies; engagement with local and global communities; and operational excellence.

Interdisciplinarity

Interdisciplinarity encourages collaboration and exchange among faculty, students and staff across disciplines and fields of study. It fosters cross-fertilization of ideas and novel insights that enhance our ability to address multi-faceted societal challenges.

Experiential Learning & Career Guidance

Experiential learning and career guidance ensure that students "learn-by-doing" through curricular and extra-curricular activities in simulated or real work contexts ensuring that they understand career options and how best to pursue them.

Equity, Diversity, Inclusion & Indigenous Strategies

EDIIS aims to create a sense of belonging among all by increasing the representation of members of equity-deserving groups and Indigenous persons among faculty, staff, and students; increasing understanding of bias, systemic racism, and related phenomena experienced by members of equity-deserving groups while attending to strategic objectives distinct to Indigenous persons; and reducing bias and systemic racism within the Faculty, the University, and society.

Engagement with Local & Global Communities

Engagement that spans communities from the local to the global to foster stronger relationships, mutually beneficial partnerships, international experiences, and deeper understanding of global dimensions of local, national, and global challenges.

Operational Excellence

Operational excellence calls for the responsive, effective, and efficient delivery of professional and administrative support services to advance the overall mission of the Faculty.

WHERE ARE WE NOW?

Over the past year, Social Sciences has made progress on each pillar. Here are a few of this year's milestones:

Interdisciplinarity

- Wilson College of Leadership and Civic Engagement was established. A joint initiative of the Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences, the College will confer joint degrees in leadership and civic studies and a discipline from Social Science or Humanities to prepare interdisciplinary graduates equipped with the theoretical and experiential training to the address the complex challenges facing societies.
- In 2023, Wilson College developed two interdisciplinary academic opportunities to be offered in 2023-24: a new undergraduate minor in Leadership and Civic Studies and a new graduate seminar on special topics in leadership was approved in spring 2023. It also developed an undergraduate combined honours degree in Leadership and Civic Studies that is currently moving through the approval process.

Experiential Learning and Career Guidance

- In 2023, the Faculty launched its first co-operative education programs with the Departments of Political Science and Economics and the School of Labour Studies, admitting 31 students into the co-op program options.
- The Faculty bolstered staffing in career advising, employer engagement, and alumni engagement to enhance opportunities for hands-on learning, coaching and mentorship, and professional networking opportunities during their studies and beyond.
- Careers and Experiential Education saw a 43% increase in career advising appointments across comparable years.
- The Department of Political Science partnered with the Office of Alumni Engagement to facilitate mentorship and networking opportunities for in-course students, connecting them with more than 70 alumni from the department.

Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Indigenous Strategies

- Over the past year, the Faculty celebrated the public launch of the Indigenous Studies Department and facilitated appointment changes for faculty members wishing to move their academic appointments to the new department.
- In the Office of the Associate Dean, Undergraduate Studies, the first-year advisors hosted a
 Bridging Event for local access schools, providing students and guidance counsellors new
 opportunities to engage in sessions with our academic advisors and prepare for university
 studies.

Engagement with Local and Global Communities

- The Department of Political Science launched two new certificates with international university partners.
- The Community Research Platform continued to expand its community reach, facilitating community-engaged research between McMaster faculty and students and participating community organizations to advance scholarship and address needs of our community.
- Careers and Experiential Education hired a talent partnership consultant to engage local employers to better determine the skills and aptitudes that are prioritized or required in today's workplace.
- Spark expanded local and regional collaborations with community organizations through Brighter Spark Applied Research. Leading global experts also shared their research insights with the McMaster community through virtual Spark Talks.
- Karen Robson was awarded the Scholar-in-Community Fellowship with community partners the Hamilton Community Foundation, the Higher Education Quality Council of Ontario, Hamilton Wentworth District School Board, Hamilton Wentworth District Catholic School Board and Mohawk College.

Operational Excellence

- The Faculty sponsored 14 staff to complete Lean Six Sigma Green Belt Training to support efforts to improve operational efficiency across departments.
- Data analyst Victor Barboza Brito developed infrastructure and dashboards to collect, analyze, and report data to facilitate data-informed decision making within the Faculty of Social Sciences.
- Human Resources in the Office of the Dean launched a pilot project to provide centralized support for temp/casual hires, re-hires, and time reporting for four departments to increase efficiency and improve tracking.
- The communications portfolio expanded to include marketing and recruitment for undergraduate, and eventually graduate recruitment. This change will support departmental efforts to recruit and provide a connection between the Associate Dean's office and the central communications team.

People

Overall, the Faculty of Social Sciences attracted and retained some of the best and brightest in their respective fields. The faculty complement grew from 129.5 in 2021/22 to 135.8 in 2022/23, while the permanent support staff complement increased from 63.44 (21/22) to 72.87 (22/23).

RESEARCH FUNDING

Across the Faculty, our members had a 68% success rate for submitted grants accounting for \$3,520,982 in new researching funding from July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. See **Appendix A** for a complete list of grants and submission data.

Applications for Funding

Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC)

In SSHRC's flagship Insight Grant competition, applicants from Social Sciences had a 42% success rate (5 of 12 applications were successful). Our researchers exceeded national success rates in the Insight Development Grant competition with a 62% success rate (8 of 13 applications from FSS successful), the Partnership Engage Grant competition with a 100% success rate (6 applications were successful), and the Connection Grant competition with a 100% success rate (2 applications were successful). These performances are an indicator of the impact and quality of the projects our researchers are pursuing, and researchers develop. Researchers also achieved strong results in an array of highly competitive local and national non-tri-agency competitions, securing \$2 million in research support from these sources.

Faculty of Social Sciences Research Awards

The Faculty's internal awards are annual nomination-based research awards. Four faculty members received these awards in 2022-23.

The Early Career Researcher Award: Jonathan Zhang (Economics) and Jennifer Ma (Social Work).

The ECR recognizes research excellence by an early-stage faculty member. This is demonstrated through contributions to one's field of study, providing a stimulating research environment that incorporates students and teaching and effectively communicating research results.

The Impact Award: Victor Satzewich (Sociology).

The Impact award recognizes outstanding long-term research outcomes that take the form of changed thinking, behaviours and policy, research impacts, knowledge mobilization, and/or outreach activities.

The Scholar-in-Community Fellowship: Karen Robson (Sociology)

This award provides a faculty member with the opportunity for research collaborations with community organizations to produce and mobilize knowledge in mutually beneficial ways. Knowledge Exchange and Mobilization

EVENTS

In 2022-23, members of the Faculty of Social Sciences reported to have organized and/or hosted 78 events, including seminars, speaker series events, conferences, symposia, and workshops, to share research with students, colleagues, and the public. SOCIAL SCIENCES NEWS

The Faculty collaborates closely with McMaster's Communications, Marketing and Public Affairs (CMPA) team to highlight the work done by our students and researchers. Articles are regularly published to McMaster's Daily News and Brighter World new sites and amplified across various social media channels to enhance the reputation of our members and programs.

In total, 62 articles about Social Sciences programs, people, and projects were posted to McMaster's central news websites: 38 articles were published on Brighter World and 24 were published on Daily News (see **Appendix D** for a complete list). Of the 38 articles published on Brighter World, half of them were republished from The Conversation Canada.

On top of these articles, the communications team published 21 articles to the Faculty and department websites. Department staff also contributed to the visibility of research efforts by producing departmental news stories and event updates for their websites. These articles are not recorded in this document; however, they contribute significantly to showcasing the excellent work done by Social Sciences faculty, researchers, staff, and students.

THE CONVERSATION CANADA

From July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023, faculty members and graduate students contributed 14 unique articles to The Conversation Canada (one article was translated to French for 15 total articles). These articles were reposted to McMaster's Brighter World website and promoted through paid advertising across social media platforms to increase their visibility with external audiences and showcase the work being done in the Social Sciences. This year, Social Sciences' contribution represents 29% of all McMaster articles published by The Conversation Canada.

MEDIA MENTIONS

The period of July 1, 2022, and June 30, 2023, was again successful for researchers in the Faculty of Social Sciences. Faculty, alumni, and students were mentioned, featured, or cited in 14,048 articles and broadcasts domestically and internationally (an average of 38 per day). This represented an increase of 4% compared to 2021-22. Those articles with Social Sciences mentions yielded 417,938 engagement activities across social media platforms (engagement is defined as likes, shares, reposts, etc.). Most engagement came from Canada, while the United States and the United Kingdom were the second and third top locations respectively.

SOCIAL MEDIA

The Faculty's social media platforms grew between July 1, 2022, and June 30, 2023. During this period, the Faculty managed four main social media channels: a Facebook account, a Twitter account, a LinkedIn account, and an Instagram account.

The team has significantly cut back on its efforts to disseminate information over Twitter (X) and is pivoting to focus efforts on LinkedIn, YouTube, and Instagram Stories and Reels (which reached a combined 136K Instagram users this year).

In total, the Faculty accounts accrued more than 13,000 fans and followers across Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and LinkedIn, a 14 per cent year-over-year change. Among our platforms, Twitter was the only one to see a drop in followers (-21), while we earned 242 new LinkedIn followers and 331 new Instagram followers.

For 2023-24, the team will continue to evolve the social media engagement strategy to support recruitment and retention of undergraduate and graduate students. Included in this evolution will be the expansion of our social media portfolio to include TikTok for student generated content and the development of LinkedIn for alumni and employer engagement.

Undergraduate Enrolment

Undergraduate enrolment in Social Sciences programs in the fiscal year 2022-23 was **4,017.8** FTE students. A decrease of approximately **4.9** per cent from the previous year.

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Undergraduate Recruitment

During the 2022-23 recruitment cycle, the Faculty received **9,651** applications for admission to level 1 programs, made an offer of admission to **7,041** (applicants (73 per cent), and received confirmation of acceptance from **1.174** student applicants (16.7%).

Experiential Education

Students enrolled in the Faculty of Social Sciences can participate in a variety of enriching experiential learning opportunities through the Careers & Experiential Education (C&EE) office. The office creates experiences that foster unique approaches to learning within a classroom, and more actively in the community as well as promoting career exploration.

Key Statistics:

- 43% increase in one-on-one career advising appointments.
- 31 students admitted into new Social Sciences co-op program options.
- 137% increase in total enrolment in SOCSCI 2EL0 career prep course.

Career Advising

A total of 298 one-on-one career advising appointments were made with the Career Development Advisor. The number of monthly appointments increased on a year-over-year basis, with a 43% increase in appointments across comparable periods. The Career Development Advisor met with students requiring assistance with

- Career planning,
- Graduate education planning, and/or
- Job searching and preparation.

The Career Development Advisor and other C&EE team members additionally offered seven in-class and extracurricular career development workshops by request. An estimated total of 171 students attended these workshops, which addressed the following topics:

- Skills identification.
- Further education information and planning, and/or
- Job readiness skills such as resume, cover letter, job searching, networking, interview preparation and LinkedIn.

Career Planning and Skill Development

The 2022-2023 reporting year saw an increase in both capacity and uptake for Social Sciences 2EL0, with a total of 760 available seats (vs. 240 in 2021-2022), and 504 total registrations (vs. 212 the previous year).

Work-Integrated Learning

Work-integrated learning is a form of experiential learning in which students undertake placements with a work setting.

- 19 interns undertook paid positions. The program offered 97 paid internship postings that garnered 383 applications.
- 129 unpaid academic placements were undertaken by students in the context of five participating courses over the reporting period.

Student Experience Funding

The Student Experience Fund (SEF) is a reimbursement-based fund available by application to students pursuing skill-development, experiential, or career-development opportunities.

Between May 1, 2022, and April 30, 2023, SEFs were awarded to 6 student projects.

In-Course Experience Funding

In-Course Experience Funding provides funding to support in-course experiential learning activities.

Funding was provided to nine courses in 2022-2023 (\$4,382.07).

Co-op Program Admissions

31 students were admitted to the new Faculty of Social Sciences co-op program options:

- Honours Economics Co-op (12 students admitted).
- Honours Political Science Co-op (14 students admitted).
- Honours Work and Labour Studies Co-op (4 students admitted).

Undergraduate Student Awards

In 2022-23, undergraduate students enrolled in the Faculty of Social Sciences received nearly 500 scholarships, including entrance scholarships and in-course and graduand scholarships. In total, \$796,291.85 was distributed through 79 different scholarships to 430 unique students. See **Appendix F** for a complete list of the undergraduate student awards.

WILSON COLLEGE OF LEADERSHIP AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

In September 2022, McMaster announced the launch of Canada's most comprehensive leadership and civic engagement college funded by a \$50-million gift from Chancellor Emeritus Lynton "Red" Wilson. The goal of the college is to train the next generation of interdisciplinary leaders who understand the complex challenges facing our world and are committed to strengthening societies.

Wilson College, which is a joint initiative of the Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences, achieved several key milestones:

- Wilson College of Leadership and Civic Engagement received approval from the Board of Governors and a core planning committee was established.
- Recruitment of the inaugural Academic Director
- Establishment of the External Advisory Council

- A proposal for an Undergraduate Joint Honours BA Program in Leadership and Civic Studies was developed and awaits approval.
- An Undergraduate Minor Program in Leadership and Civic Studies was developed and approved.
- A Wilson Graduate Seminar was developed and approved, commencing in Winter 2024.
- Architects were selected and a feasibility student completed for a new building to house Wilson College

We look forward to another busy year in 2023-24 as the infrastructure of Wilson College continues to take shape and marketing and engagement efforts commence to recruit the inaugural undergraduate class for September 2025.

Financial Matters

The table below presents a high-level statement of our finances for 2022-23. A few aspects are noteworthy:

- 97.2% of FSS revenue is derived from tuition and government funding for students enrolled in our undergraduate and graduate programs and students we teach in our courses.
- 43.8% of our revenue was paid as contributions to support central university support services, which range from heat to human resources to the library and to the President's Office.
- Aside from these central contributions, over 93% of FSS expenditures are for people: faculty, staff, and TA support.
- In 2022–23, the Faculty ran a deficit of \$51,075.
