Carl Schmitt, Political Theology, chapter 3 (with knowledge of chapter 1 in the background)

Detailed Instructions: In well-written paragraphs, a total of 600–700 words, please address the following two questions with detailed reference to the text:

- 1. According to Schmitt, how is the rejection of the "exception" in political or legal theory analogous to the theological rejection of the miracle?
- 2. What observations does Schmitt make about historic "rationalism" and "scientific thinking," and what is their connection to his theory of sovereignty (his theory of the state)?

Please <u>number your answers</u> to the individual questions.

As was the case for the Text Summary assignment, all your observations about the text should be backed up with references that allow your reader to see what they are based on; for this purpose, please use in-text parenthetical page references, as in this sample sentence:

Locke underscores that acts of violence are sometimes perpetrated "upon pretence of Religion" (23).

Please print your assignment to PDF, <u>double-spaced</u>, with <u>one-inch margins</u>, using an 11–12-point font, and with <u>no cover sheet</u>. Please write your name and "Text Preparation 2" at the top, and indicate the total word count at the end.

<u>Note</u>: Since this is your first reading of this text, taking place before you hear the lecture about it or participate in tutorial discussion about it, the summary assignment is simply a first effort at figuring out what the text says, and and completing the assignment is meant to help you get the most of the lecture and discussion on it. The assignment is not evaluated for whether it demonstrates a good understanding of the reading, but for evidence of your having worked in detail to understand the reading. Your fuller understanding will develop through your participation in the ongoing course activities, and with successive re-readings.
