Text Preparation assignments are designed to help you prepare the reading assignment for a particular date, in advance of listening to the lecture on that date, in which I go over that reading selection, offering you a chance to re-read and refine your understanding as you follow along with the lecture. For this reason, this assignment must be submitted by June 6, 9 a.m., prior to listening to Lecture 9, which will be released at 9 a.m. on that day.

- Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, “Civil and Religious Law in England: A Religious Perspective” (2008)

Detailed Instructions: In well-written paragraphs, a total of 600–700 words, please address both questions below with detailed reference to the text:

1. Looking broadly at the arguments of chapters 1 and 3, what connection(s) can you identify between Schmitt’s opening claim in chapter 1 that “sovereign is the one who decides on the exception” and his opening claim in chapter 3 that all important political concepts are secularized theological concepts?
2. What does Rowan Williams mean by “plural jurisdiction”? In what ways does he view this concept as key to developing a renewed understanding of the relationship between civil and religious law?

Please number your answers to the individual questions.

As was the case for the Text Summary assignment, all your observations about the text should be backed up with references that allow your reader to see what they are based on; for this purpose, please use in-text parenthetical page references, as in this sample sentence:

Locke underscores that acts of violence are sometimes perpetrated “upon pretence of Religion” (23).

Please print your assignment to PDF, double-spaced, with one-inch margins, using an 11–12-point font, and with no cover sheet. Please write your name and “Text Preparation 3” at the top, and indicate the total word count at the end.

Note: Since this is your first reading of this text, taking place before you hear the lecture about it or participate in tutorial discussion about it, the summary assignment is simply a first effort at figuring out what the text says, and completing the assignment is meant to help you get the most out of the

The assignment is not evaluated for whether it demonstrates a good understanding of the reading, but for evidence of your having worked in detail to understand the reading. Your fuller understanding will develop through your participation in the ongoing course activities, and with successive re-readings.
