

SOCIAL SCIENCES I: CHOOSING YOUR COURSES

It's time to pick your courses! At the end of your first year, you will apply to a degree program.

You will need to take a minimum of 24 units in your first year to apply to a second-year degree program and can take a maximum of 30 units. **18 units must be Social Sciences courses.** Note: One Fall or Winter Term course is typically worth 3 units. A full year course is worth 6 units. The final number in the course code is equal to the number of units that course is worth (e.g. ECON 1B03 = 3 units).

Your required courses must be chosen from the **Social Sciences Level I Courses List** (included on page 4). Required courses may vary, depending on your Level II admission requirements. Your elective courses can also be from this list or from another Faculty (pending pre-requisites).

- 1** Identify the degree programs you are interested in for Level II from the **Social Sciences Degree Programs List** (on pages 2-3) and select the courses you need to take in Level I to be considered for your programs of interest. Record these in the Required Social Sciences Courses table (below, left column).
- 2** Select the remaining Social Sciences courses you need to reach 18 units from the **Social Sciences Level 1 Courses List** (included on page 4). Record these in the Required Social Sciences Courses table (below, left column).
- 3** Select between 6-12 units of electives. Your elective courses can also be from the **Social Sciences Level 1 Course List** (included on page 4) or from another Faculty (pending pre-requisites). Record these in the Elective Courses table (below, right column).
