

# ECONOMICS I: CHOOSING YOUR COURSES

It's time to pick your courses! At the end of your first year, you will apply to one of the following degree programs:

- Honours Bachelor of Arts - Economics
- Honours Bachelor of Arts - Economics (Specialist Option)
- Honours Bachelor of Arts - Economics and Mathematics
- Honours Bachelor of Arts - Economics and Computer Science
- Combined Honours Bachelor of Arts - Economics and Another Subject
- Bachelor of Arts - Economics

Fill out the remaining spaces below to help pick your courses. You will need to take a minimum of 24 units in Level I to apply to a Level II degree program, and can take a maximum of 30 units.

*Note: One Fall or Winter term course is typically worth 3 units. The final number in the course code is equal to the number of units that course is worth. (e.g ECON 1BA3 = 3 units)*

Your required Economics I courses are listed below, in the in each table on the left side. Your remaining required units of Social Sciences courses must be selected from the **Social Sciences Course List** on page 3. Your elective courses can also be selected from this list, or from another Faculty (pending prerequisites). Where applicable, required elective courses are listed below, in each table on the right side. These required elective courses will vary depending on the Economics degree program you wish to enter in Level II.

**Note: If you did not take Grade 12 Calculus and Vectors (MCV4U), you must complete MATH 1F03 - Introduction to Calculus and Analytic Geometry in Level I, as a prerequisite for Economics. MATH 1F03 is an elective course.**
